Duckpond Park: one student's vision

How about a decorative fountain at the Sweetwater Branch outfall on NE 10th Avenue behind the entry feature? Or, dedicated bike paths through "Duckpond Park"? Or, closing the bridges at 6th, 7th and 9th Avenues to cars?

These are just three elements of Jay McLeod's visionary upgrade for Duckpond Park presented at the September meeting of the Duckpond Neighborhood Association (DNA). Jay, a UF grad student in Urban Planning, developed the proposal as part of his coursework. His presentation was accompanied by beautifully detailed graphics and a three page illustrated handout.

Specifically, the proposal consists of five elements:

- Addition of bike lanes surrounding the park, an internal, continuous walking path, more benches, trees, trash cans, doggie bag stands, and pedestrian oriented street lamps.
- Regrading and landscaping the riparian zone to promote a more natural water flow as well as a healthy habitat for aquatic organisms.
- Closing the bridges to automobiles at 6th, 7th, and 9th Avenues, replacing



the asphalt with a gazebo feature, a playground and an orchard at those locations thus creating a true "park" between the boulevards.

- Repaying Northeast Boulevard with ecologically friendly pervious pavement, plugging drains to prevent street pollutants from discharging into Sweetwater Branch, and installing new curbs that would allow storm water drainage into natural, riparian soils.
- Integration of a Duckpond Park bike path with the 6th Street Rail-Trail, the 2nd Avenue Bike-Trail and the Depot Avenue Rail-Trail.

A dream? Possibly. But yet a transformative vision for an even more livable Duckpond for future generations.

A historical note: "Duckpond Park" which runs from about NE 10th Avenue and North Main Street, then between the two sides of "The Boulevard" to NE 5th

Avenue, and maybe beyond, is shown on a 1945 map as "Highlands Park."

Exploring Connections: Sweetwater Branch

This summer, 29 young people (ages 8 to 12) and 10 senior citizens (including a number of our neighbors) participated in a week long travelling day camp called *Generation Connection*. The camp spent one day learning about the Sweetwater Creek that flows through our neighborhood (and includes our duck pond). The participants learned how this small, meandering creek plays an important role in our everyday lives.

Historically, Sweetwater Branch was a small, spring-fed stream. As Gainesville grew, the creek was channelized to help control flooding in the city. Sweetwater Branch creek now flows from near the Main Street *Publix* right through the heart of downtown and ultimately into *Paynes Prairie State Preserve* where it goes underground through the Alachua Sink. Once underground, the water from the Sweetwater Branch eventually becomes part of the Floridan Aquifer which is where we all get our drinking water.

The Generation Connection first met with senior camper Bill Pepper at Alachua Sink to learn about the history of Payne's Prairie. Next, the group moved upstream on the Sweetwater Branch to meet with Stacie Greco of the Alachua County Environmental Protection Department. Stacie explained the important link between our actions, the health of our creek and, ultimately, the health of our drinking water. Finally the group visited the entrance into the Duckpond on NE 10th Avenue where all the storm water from the Main Street Publix shopping center parking lot flows into the creek.

While the water in the creek appears clear and clean, it contains pollutants, such as pet waste, fertilizers, oils and

trash. These pollutants regularly wash off of our yards and streets directly into the creek.

In addition to these pollutants in the water, there are sewage pipes along this creek that sometimes leak untreated sewage into the water. Also, a portion of the creek flows downstream of *Gainesville Regional Utilities* wastewater treatment facility, which has a permit to discharge nearly six million gallons of treated wastewater per day into the creek.

Our everyday actions—whether flushing a toilet or fertilizing our yard—impact the health of our creek—and ultimately our drinking water! Here are some ways we can all help:

- Take care of pet wastes—scoop it, bag it, trash it
 - Avoid applying fertilizers
- Plant native plants and build rain barrels to collect rainwater for water conservation
 - Please don't litter
- Put cooking oils in the trash instead of down the sink drain
- Conserve water by fixing leaks, irrigating less, and not running water when brushing teeth or washing dishes
 - Tell others how they can help too!

Did you know?

Sweetwater Branch supports several forms of wildlife. Fish species such as the mosquitofish are abundant in most reaches of the creek. Common birdlife includes most of the native songbirds of the Gainesville area, woodpeckers, red-tailed hawks, osprey, and barred owls. Alligators, turkeys, and aquatic turtles are quite common as the stream approaches Paynes Prairie State Preserve.

New Citizen's Co-op opening near Duckpond

Citizens Co-op is a grocery cooperative located at 435 South Main Street, an easy walk or bike ride from the Duckpond. Two years ago, when Duckpond residents Liz Nesbit and Gretchen McIntyre realized that it was strange that Gainesville lacked the kind of cooperative grocery store that gives similar college towns a vibrant community anchor, they set to work. The result is Citizens Co-op. Our mission is to help grow a communitybased food system through a fullservice market, offering a bountiful selection of natural foods and products by purchasing first, whenever possible, from local producers and vendors.

If our community supports us fully, we project that we will be able to open our storefront within the next few months. The space is already beautiful, and is in

the process of being renovated with the most eco-friendly fixtures possible. We will have a full range of sustainable, local, and organic grocery items, as well as a café with seating space in the courtyard, paved with 100-year-old salvaged bricks from the Main Street renovation project. We'll strive to provide a community center that enables people from all economic and social sectors to come together in building an improved food culture in our neighborhoods. We have already established a large community garden in the Porters Quarters neighborhood, and have applied to accept food stamps. We believe everyone deserves the chance to eat the freshest and healthiest food available.

Because Citizens Co-op is owned by our consumer, producer, and worker

Keeping the Duckpond a great place to live!

The Duckpond Neighborhood Association is in need of people who are willing to help out with a few things. We always welcome new board members, but you do not need to be on the board to help! Volunteering for the DNA is a great opportunity to get to know your neighbors, and to get to know what is going on in and around the neighborhood. Below are some of the functions we need people for, the more the merrier!

- Wagon Rides Captain to get volunteers together for the annual holiday wagon rides (first weekend in December, same night as the Christmas tree lighting and the luminaries).
- Advertising Manager to help contact new and current advertisers for our newsletter (four issues per year).

- Roper Park Chair to help look into landscaping or other ideas to further improve Roper Park and help make these improvements happen. Similarly, we have an opening for a NE Park Chair.
- Membership Chair to help think of ways to recruit more members, and to get more neighbors to come to the meetings.
- Social Event Planner to organize fun events, such as a neighborhood picnic or a kids' game day.
- Metcalfe Elementary School Liaison to help think of, and help pursue, initiatives to make our public neighborhood school become more attractive (e.g. international baccalaureate?).
- Crime Watch/GPD Liaison to arrange forums and events to help prevent crime.

members, the Co-op will be run democratically, and members can be as intimately involved as they wish. We currently have over 575 members even before the store has opened, and we welcome new members and investors. The sooner we can get a critical mass, the sooner the storefront opens. Members are given one vote per household, will not have to work, and dividends will be shared according to how faithfully members shop at the Coop over the course of a year. A family membership costs \$100 for life, is refundable if the member wishes to depart, and will never have to be renewed: we also have low-income and student memberships on request. Investor shares are open

to members, cost \$500, and will return 8% before dividends are paid out at the end of the year. Your investment will stay local and allow us to pay our employees a living wage and benefits. We'd love your help in providing our community with diverse, wholesome, and quality foods, a dependable market for regional growers, and an inspiring model for sustainable business that demonstrates the viability of local investment and cooperation.

Meet neighborhood artist Eleanor Blair

Eleanor Blair came to Gainesville in 1971. Inspired by the town and the Duckpond neighborhood, it didn't take long for her to turn from painting abstracts to painting landscapes. In her early years, she taught classes for the *Gainesville Fine Arts Association* and Santa Fe Junior College. She joined the Artisan's Market (where she had more luck selling crocheted hats than paintings back in the seventies), and has exhibited in the *Downtown Spring Arts Festival* every single year since 1972.

In 1990, she started the *Tench Artist's Studios*, and in 1991 she moved into her current studio next door at 113 South Main Street (open Tuesday–Saturday. 4–7 p.m.). Traveling has become an important part of her work. She has painted in Scotland, Italy, Spain, Austria, Turkey, Morocco, Greece, Portugal, the Azores,




